

I have a 6X9 rather large box, can be assembled in very short order. The model I have comes with a fixed doublet uncoated enlarger lens with water house stops. Im surprised at how sharp it is. I have taken it with me when on the road, shoot during the day, process the film and print the next night to see what Ive got before moving on to a new location. In most cases I use it for proofs and working prints, but it comes in handy for some shots when I want a soft look. I believe the 35mm version has a condenser. What is the weight of this enlarger. Does anyone know Click to expand. Suffice it to say that the enlarger head is about the size and weight of a larger medium format slr. The baseboard is about the footprint of an lp record and the column is about a foot and a half total. So youre basically carring around something like another camera. Of course you need to carry processing equipmenttrays and suchBUT you can use ziplock bags instead of traysthose can be bought on site. So just bringing chemicals which may be problematic when travelling. It's not my intention to carry this enlarger with me to put it to use during my travels so chemicals trays are not really my concern. It's just that I've a chance to pick it up from someone in my upcoming travel and I'm evaluating whether it's feasible and worth carrying it in my suitcase on the return flight to home. Hence I want to know the weight of the enlarger which I couldn't find in its manual. Then weigh yourself carrying the enlarger.http://adamlegal.com/userfiles/definition-of-manual-occupations.xml

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The difference will give you the answer. Dont worry, you wont appear silly at all Apart from a suitable bulb and possibly a plug adapter, you should be good. 35mm only, and not a lot over 8x10 unless you find an extension bracket for the column. About a third of the weight is the baseboard.It could be sent via USPS Priority mail for not a ton of money. I am an apartment dweller so it lives under the bathroom sink most of the time. Not really a big deal but annoying. It is a great enlarger!Click to expand. The complete suitcase weighs 9.5kg. There were different models, but that should give an idea. I guess the most leightweight solution is the Durst Magico. Encouraged by the feedback on Durst F30s weight and dimensions, Ill try to pick this enlarger up during my travel and bring it home. It hardly added 5 kg to the weight and was small enough to fit in the suitcase with my other stuff. I dont foresee a need in the future for myself to carry this enlarger with me during my trips but I was quite positively thrilled to return home this time with an enlarger! I wonder what the evenness of light coverage is on this F30 from center to corner. Lens nothwithstanding. An opal enlarger bulb mounted vertically at the rear of the head in a white lamp space. The light travels horizontally to a mirror at the front, which directs the light down through a single condenser to a in this case glassless 35mm carrier. Most of these smaller enlargers will give you 8x10 maximum. That sounds like a lot until you realize that is the precrop magnification. As for the lensboard threading almost all enlargers use M39. I saw one of these at my local used camera shop vesterday. I will try to remember to give them a call and mine them for information. John I agree but I wasnt going to fight with anyone about it. My First enlarger was a Phillips PCS2000. Its a nicely built unit but the long exposure times required with it at least 3x the D5 Chromega type got a little frustrating. The Phillips does both additive and subtractive and can be very precisely controlled. The rub is that its a 3 lamp system varying the light passing through each filter rather than changing the filter density. Anyone know about them.
