### canon 20d manual error 99

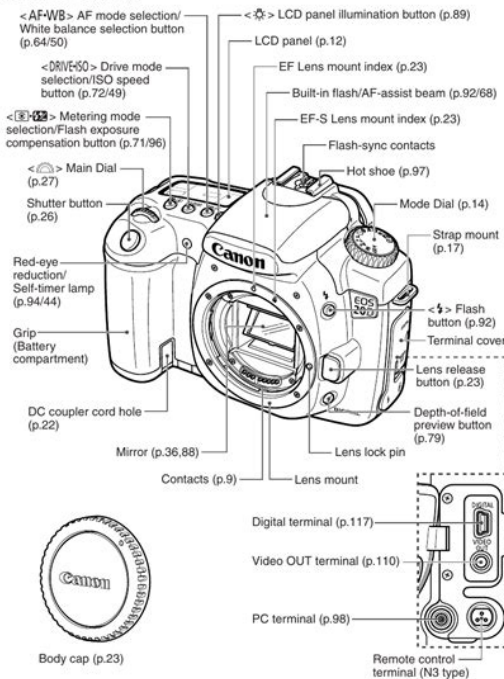


My family and I are sincerely thankful for your generosity and for giving me the chance to pursue our chosen profession path. No error on any camera is as dreaded as Error 99. If you shoot Canon and haven't seen it yet, you will. Canons certainly aren't any more prone to errors than any other camera brand, but they are a bit notorious for the infamous Error 99. Learn how to fix it now so when it happens, you aren't stuck shooting a wedding without a working camera. In short, ERR99 on your Canon camera is simply a general error. What error, you ask. That is the difficulty with troubleshooting the famous ERR99. Since it is a general error, it gives you nothing to begin with. But have no fear, I've seen the error enough times that I should be able to point you in the right direction. First they will ask you to do a clean reboot, then try switching the lens, and then they will ask you to pay to ship the camera to them, wait four weeks without a camera and then cross your fingers that the repair isn't too expensive. Hopefully it won't get to that point. The following steps address the most common causes of ERR99 and offer solutions to see if it is something you can fix yourself. Read these first before you call Canon. This could be for many different reasons. For example, if the aperture assembly on your lens is broken and needs to be replaced, the camera will tell your lens to change the aperture, the lens can't because the aperture assembly is not functioning, and so the camera will not have any confirmation that the lens obeyed its command. The result Error 99. Try the lens on a different camera, or try using a different lens on your Canon camera. This way you will know if the lens is causing the problem. A recent caller on the Improve Photography Podcast had the ERR99 problem and he solved the issue by performing this test. This is how the lens and camera communicate. If either the lens or camera contact is dirty, communication will be inhibited. <http://finchamauto.com/pics/dm007-quadcopter-manual.xml>

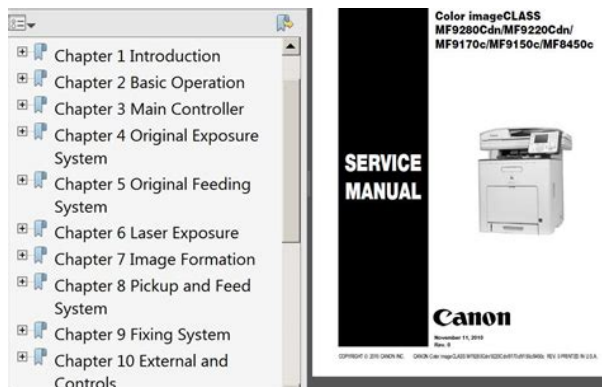
The way that the actual Canon repair facilities fix this problem is to use the eraser on a pencil. Lightly rub all of the contacts being careful to not get eraser dust in the lens or camera. If the contacts are just dirty but nothing is broken, this is a simple fix. I have personally seen this fix the dreaded ERR99. I know this sounds insultingly simple, but please try it. Tech support always suggests this fix because it so often works. One battery powers the functions of the camera, and the other battery powers the behindthescenes operations of the camera that remember your camera settings even after removing the battery, remembers the date and time, etc. One possibility is that the error concerns some function powered by this second battery. Step four is to remove two screws from the camera, slide out the tray holding this second battery, replace the battery it looks like a simple watch battery, and then restart the camera again. More specifically, follow these steps to perform a full power cycle 1 Turn off the camera, 2 Remove the lens and put on a body cap, 3 Remove the memory card, 4 Remove the main battery as well as the small backup battery, 5 Wait 5 minutes. I know it seems silly to wait. Off is off, right But I have personally seen electronics work after waiting with the battery out for 5 minutes when the standard 20 seconds didnt work. 6 Put both fresh and charged batteries back in the camera, and 7 Cross your fingers that the shutter click doesnt revive ERR99. For a diagram on how to remove this secondary battery, check out this very very thorough blog post about fixing ERR99 issues. The best way to eliminate this as being a problem is to simply get a brand new card and put it in the camera to see if the problem continues after a reboot. If that isnt an option, at least try one other used card to make sure it isnt a corrupt card.<http://medes.ru/img/lib/dm-350a-manual.xml>



Next, if you havent been using your cards correctly, we should make sure you arent doing something upon import of your photos that is causing errors in your memory cards database. Put the memory card in the camera and do a full reformat. Do not just erase images, go into the menu and look for "Format Card". If the camera cannot format the card, there is a good chance the card is the issue. If you found this post to be helpful, you'd be a perfect fit to join our community on Facebook. Shooting into the light would most likely involve smaller apertures. If there is a fault with the aperture assembly preventing it from stopping down, then that could be the issue.

Turned it off and on again, it was ok for 1 pic. Luckily I also received an adapter I had ordered to match some old Olympus lenses to the 350d. I know it's not ideal to shoot on manual all the time but it saves leaving your camera in its bag. The adapter cost 10 and old SLR lenses aren't expensive. Hope this helps somebody, Gerry. I had a similar problem with a 1Ds I bought also from eBay and "inspired" by your input, I solved it after connecting it to the AC charger instead of the battery previously I tried several other procedures unsuccessfully! The shutter fires when the battery is inserted, and when the switch is moved every other position, off, on, or arrow. The shutter button itself is nonfunctional. Lifting the mirror and inspecting the shutter as suggested in Richards notes did not turn up anything.It just flips out whenever I try and take a picture. Usually, after clicking the camera on and off a few times, it will only take one picture, after around eight or nine different attempts. I have heard that if you remove BOTH batteries and the hardware, Lens, memory card, batteries, and let it sit for around five to ten minutes, it will remove the error. Im optimistic about it, and might try it. Ill send word if it works. Since your got the error after a fall, I would check the lens itself. The error may originate by a lensbody failure to communicate. Remove the lens and clean the contacts with an eraser and replace it.Try using a different card. This could be the battery, memory card or a shutter failure.

If it doesn't crap out, it was the card. Replace the battery and try again. If cleaning the contacts and replacing the lens does not work, the shutter went bad. Sadly, this isn't an easy fix for most people so you will likely have to go to a shop. It is possible, but you are tearing the whole camera down since Canon didn't intend for this to last more than 50k actuations due to the class of camera this is. Just take out BOTH batteries. There's a date and time in the same slot as the main battery. You should be able to find it after a minute of sliding a finger on the sides. Check where the door hinge is. Once that's done, remove the lens and CF card and have a cap put on, before leaving it for five to ten minutes. Capacitors inside may still have a charge, even after 20 seconds. Since I have a 20D that I've dropped, we're in the same boat. I'll try it and give you feedback once I have seen if it works. 20D's are great cameras. If you are planning to get rid of it after you've had your satisfaction, give it as a gift to an aspiring photographer. I've had mine for a while now, and I've not have a problem with it until I dropped it. But, stay optimistic, I'm hoping as well. The err99 came up and stayed after taking the battery and card out for about an hour. I read too quickly and didn't see the lens part. I used my microfiber cloth to wipe the inside of the lens, stuck the cloth inside and twisted it around real good, wiped down the metal leads on the lenses, also the leads on the inside of the camera, reattached and now it works. I think it may have been the cleaning of the leads that did it. Just thought I'd pass this on. So now how about my autofocus problem. Then I get the CF error, so I turn off the camera, take that out, put it back in and format it, turn the camera on and get the error 99 message again. I turn the camera off again, take the battery out and replace it, turn the camera back on, and hello, I get the CF error message again. and on and on we go.

Sometimes I can push the shutter button and the flash cover will pop up, but nothing else happens. I've cleaned the contacts on the lens. I've read all 21 pages of FAQs to try to find anything to help me, even emailed the former owner. I'm hoping you can help me. I haven't really fiddled with many of the settings yet, so I don't think I've pushed something I shouldn't have. Oh and I've tried 2 different cards, same deal, plus on one all the pictures were lost, though I didn't format that card because it was already in the camera. Help! I'm assuming this is the problem, and that now I must find the closest Canon repair place and go there or mail the camera there. I hope they'll tell me the cost beforehand. Has anyone had this problem fixed before and how much did it set you back? I don't suppose I can fix it myself. The camera is in need of repair. However, it is no longer in service life and replacement parts are no longer available for us to repair it for you. You may participate in the Canon Loyalty Program instead. The Canon Loyalty Program option allows you to replace your current camera for a discounted fee, plus shipping. The original nonfunctioning camera would then be returned to Canon USA for recycling using a prepaid shipping label that would be provided. If you would like to take part in this option, please call our Sales Department at 800 OK CANON 8006522666 seven days a week, 8am to Midnight. Let them know you have been working with online support and the Canon Loyalty Program was offered. Be sure to have your serial number for your camera at the time of your call. Please click the Accept as Solution button so that others may find the answer as well. I let it sit for 10 mins or so and put it back together. I take a couple pictures and repeat the process. Is there really no way to fix it. I LOVE this camera! To isolate the cause of the issue:

1. Remove the battery, lens and card as you have been doing.
2. Put the battery back in the camera and power it on.

If the error still shows, the camera will need to be repaired. If not:

3. Put the card back in the camera.
4. Power the camera on. Does the error appear? If so, try using a different card. When you use another card and the error goes away, the cause is the first card you were using and you will need to use a different card. However, if the error never shows to begin with:
5. Clean the contacts on the lens with a soft microfiber cleaning cloth.
6. Reattach the lens.
7. Power the camera on. Does the error appear? If so, try using a different lens. If the error only shows with one particular lens attached, that lens may need to be serviced. If it shows with any lens attached, the camera may need to be serviced. To start the repair process, you'll need to complete a Repair Request on our website.

Please click the Accept as Solution button so that others may find the answer as well. Get a new battery is not. Fully charged battery of course. You can straighten the bent pins but you need a long needle nose plier to do it. Something like a jewelry store would have. They are fragile and easily broken off if bent too much. There should be local camera repair shops that can do this for you. The EOS 20D 8MP is a reasonably good camera but it isn't worth a great deal of repair money. If the error 99 occurs without the lens attached, then the camera does have a shutter malfunction.
